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Dr. Leodrey Williams Was Officially Named Chancellor Emeritus of the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center

Former Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center Chancellor, Leodrey Williams, Ed.D., has been officially named Chancellor Emeritus of the Ag Center. The status was bestowed upon Dr. Williams on July 21, 2023 during the Southern University System's Board of Supervisors meeting.

Supervisors meeting. Dr. Williams, who was the first Chancellor of the Southern University Ag Center, began his professional career in Agriculture with Cooperative Extension in 1965 as a County Agricultural Agent at Louisiana State University. In 1995, he returned to Southern as the Cooperative Extension Director, and in 2001, was asked to lead the newly formed Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, the fifth campus of the Southern University System. He held this position for 14 years. After a total of 50 years of service, Dr. Williams retired from the Southern University Ag Center on June 30, 2015.

In 1972, Southern University established its own extension office and hired Williams as an Agricultural Specialist, along with a small staff, to recruit and create programs. He later held several positions at both Southern University and Louisiana State University. Dr. Williams earned a bachelor's degree in vocational agriculture education from Southern University, a Master of Science in Extension Education, and a Doctor of Education degree in Extension Education/Administration, both from Louisiana State University.

He was appointed the Acting Administrator of the United States Department of Agriculture's Extension Service for all U.S. states and territories. He was also elevated to Associate Administrator of the Cooperative State Research, Education and Extension Service (CSREES), the precursor to the National Institute for Food and Agriculture, USDA-NIFA He has served on several national and

Southern University Research Professors Drs. Lashunda Hodges, Jacqueline McComb, and Crystal Vance attended the 2023 National Cooperative Soil Survey Conference at Bismarck State College in Bismarck, North Dakota, from July 9 - 13, 2023.

The National Conference convenes every two years to discuss and develop solutions to issues of concern to the National Cooperative Soil Survey Program.

The conference, themed, "Soil, Energy, and Agriculture for Resilient Ecosystems," included scheduled events such as expansive field tours, morning networking sessions, oral poster presentations, and seminars from USDA Natural Resources Conversation Service (NRCS) leadership and scientists that explored the history, geology, and soils of Western North Dakota. The conference is a component of the awarded \$150,000 from the USDA-NRCS cooperative agreement to assess the soil health status of urban soils affected by flooding at the Southern University Baton Rouge Campus. Attendance at this conference further supports climate-smart agriculture and soil health initiatives to manage dynamic soil properties that aid in predicting soil responses to help policymakers, land managers, producers, and others who make decisions that protect soil function.



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

SU College of Ag Holds Its Inaugural FAB Lab Camp

The Southern University College of Ag held its first Fashion and Business Laboratory (FAB Lab) Youth Leadership Program Summer Camp July 17-28, 2023 in Pinkie Thrift Hall.

The camp, which was open to students aged 12 – 18, taught participants about textiles, fashion design, and apparel entrepreneurship.

"I developed this camp after hearing my students say that they wanted to open their own businesses," said Dr. Samii Kennedy Benson, camp organizer and Assistant Professor of Apparel Merchandising and Textiles in the CAFCS. "I wanted to assist my students and several of them have volunteered during this camp."

During the camp, participants learned to hand sew a pin cushion and used a sewing machine to make handbags out of t-shirts, hats out of jeans, and tie-dyed skorts and pajama pants.

The camp ended with a fashion show where the participants modeled the items they made during the camp for their parents.

To apply to the camp, the students had to write a one-page essay explaining his/her interest in fashion and apparel entrepreneurship and highlighting their leadership skills and academic excellence, along with a \$25 registration fee and a completed waiver form.

Fresh and Zesty: **Micro-farm Hydroponics** at **Mayberry Dining Hall**

If you have visited Mayberry Dining Hall on Southern University's campus recently, you may have wondered what the glass box sitting in the corner is used for. The box is a Babylon Micro-Farm Galleri, a hydroponic micro-farm system used to grow plants.

Initially, SU Ag Center's Agricultural Natural Resources Program Leader, Zanetta Augustine asked Horticultural Extension Agent, Micheal "Terra" Polite, to volunteer with her to revitalize the Galleri. Terra has diligently communicated with Southern's Campus Dining and the Babylon Company to get the machine up and running again, including cleaning and calibrating the chemicals and sensors and ordering plants. At the same time. Augustine has helped calculate the logistics involving Southern's Campus Dining Hall and the SU Ag Center.

This project aims to provide the cafeteria with a beautiful display of produce in the hydroponic microfarm and connect the student body with the opportunity to understand how efficiently a hydroponic farm should be managed.

Upon starting, the farm was an empty glass box not being utilized to its full potential. With the help of Augustine, Polite, and East Baton Rouge Extension Agent, Cornelius Jackson, Jr. the unit received a full detailed cleaning. Since its cleaning, Polite has made weekly visits to the unit, finding this method to be most efficient for maximum production and to balance the time management of other projects with the Ag Center.

The kitchen staff has shown interest in the unit since its first microgreens harvest on July 12, 2023. The 'Spicy Microgreen Mix' was harvested and given to Chef Lee to garnish the scalloped potatoes. The cooking staff appeared very excited about the new addition.

"The unit runs itself," Polite stated. "I generally go right before Mayberry opens for lunch so that I have an opportunity to draw people over while I am working."

He went on to say that several professors, cafeteria staff, summer campers, and students have approached the unit with interest. Many with questions about how plants can grow without sunlight.

"This unit has everything! The hi-tech automation, full-spectrum lights, and chemical monitoring system allow for a seamless and user-friendly



SU Ag Center's Donovan Segura Served as the Keynote Speaker for Land-Grant Summer Meeting

Donovan L. Segura, Ph.D., Associate Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Title IX at the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center will serve as the keynote speaker for the Association of 1890 Research Directors (ARD) and Southern Association of Agricultural Experiment Station Directors (SAAESD) Summer Meeting.

The meeting was held August 9-10, 2023 in Atlanta, GA. This marked the first joint meeting of these two organizations and focused on the development of impactful programming and relationship building among the 1890 and 1862 institutions at the state and regional levels.

As the keynote speaker, Dr. Segura demonstrated the importance of building relationships based on trust and mutual respect between the 1890 and 1862 Colleges of Agriculture.

The ARD is the federation of the 19 autonomous 1890 land-grant universities that provides coordination of research initiatives among member 1890 Institutions in cooperation with federal, state, and private partners.

SAAESD is one of five regional associations with responsibilities for facilitating the cooperation of regional and national research.

Dr. Segura also serves as a Professor of Public Policy and Public Administration at Southern University and A&M College. In March, he was sworn in as the President-Elect of the Conference of Minority of Public Administrators.

He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science, a Master of Arts in Social Science, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Public Policy Administration, all from Southern University and A&M College in Baton Rouge.



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
